We learned about vernal pools and grassland management, including how cattle's taste for non-native grasses helps the vernal pools thrive, such that their grazing is used to manage the vegetation on the property. Blaze explained about the role of pocket gophers in the mima mounds. We were given lots of handouts. The weather was wonderful and our timing for the wildflower bloom was perfect. Great Trip!



Fieldtrip Report - 4/13/24 A Typical Exploration of Central Nevada

Once again conditions were good, the desert was drying out after recent storms, so I invited a friend rockhounding. He was game, and suggested we look for blue gem silica and ammonites at a spot that shall remain nameless. I promised him purple fluorite in return, a good trade!

Tom invited a couple friends who had previously been out on a tour with me, experienced desert explorers and general all-around Good People. We agreed upon a meeting time at Grimes Point, the traditional rock club rendezvous point in that region. It has bathrooms, lol. The day before our scheduled meeting time, we discovered everyone was ready early, packed, and eager to go, so we all left our homes early in the afternoon, headed east to the desert.

I stopped at the Hazen Mud Mounds, known for OHV's, hot springs and fossils. The spring was unuseable, and I almost got seriously stuck in heavy, deep mud. (Go figure, with a name like "mud mounds.") I did find a cave with pictographs along the prehistoric Lake Lahontan shoreline; keep your eyes open for red pigment on tufa in that area. As I returned to pavement, I realized I had so much clay/mud stuck to my truck, that it was messing with my suspension and alignment, so I stopped at Fallon to wash my truck. My apologies to car wash staff for destroying your wash bay!




Continuing east out of Fallon, I passed Sand Mountain and the lonely pioneer children's grave, finally coming into view of our new meeting point, camp "somewhere along the slopes of Chalk Mountain, probably the east side, because that's where all the good diggings are." The desert is still wet, with washouts, but I finally found my way to the east side of the mountain, and they weren't there. But that was ok, because I was enjoying the roads and sunset on Chalk Mountain. And then a miracle occured, I had phone service and they called me to tell me they were on the west side! Off I tore to their camp, just in time for a hot meal. The sun set, contrails from Navy aircraft still illuminated by the light far overhead.






The four of us spent the next two days visiting fluorite mines in the area, collecting purple and clear specimens, plus some nice quartz clusters. The roads are still washed out from last year's epic storms, so it took us a full day of manic driving on jeep trails just to reach the first prospect. But from there it was awesome possum!



Basecamp was at an old ranch site, with actual trees, a nice creek, and a Sergeant York mobile AA gun. I stayed up later then when I'm camping solo, good company and all. Aircraft had dog fights far overhead, and at one point a Blackhawk helicopter popped over the closest ridge to buzz our camp. A string of 40+ Starlink satellites passed overhead, looking at first like a comet.

The fourth day we headed south a couple hours to a mining district near Mina. After a couple quick detours for gas, then agates, then donuts on a playa, we headed up a rocky road into the mining area, quickly finding bright blue/green pebbles of chrysocolla everywhere. Fossils may be also found in the area, but our goal was some sweet copper minerals, gem silica specifically. And on a rocky summit full of adits we found some! Such a beautiful, blue mineral, definitely superior to simple chrysocolla. There was also enough chrysocolla, pretty in its own right, to satisfy perhaps endless rock club fieldtrips. Probably because it was so difficult to reach?

From there, we all separated, some to home, others headed even further out into the desert. I got home, exhausted, washed my truck, cleaned up my nicks and scrapes, and was ready to return the next day. Maybe we'll make time for fossils next trip.

Motion I: Mike made a motion to approve the minutes from the March meeting. Lori seconded the motion, motion – carried unanimously.

There were no additions to the agenda.

Lori advised for the next month's program she has enlisted Fran Todd from Pilot Hill who will speak about opals.

Motion II: Mike made a motion to pay a speaker stipend of \$75.00. Cathie seconded, motion – carried unanimously.

There was no correspondence to report.

Treasurer's report was presented by Mike.

Motion III: Sheila made a motion to approve the treasurer's report as presented. Cathie seconded, motion – carried unanimously.

Blaze reported that Frank Van Heck will be responsible for the Vendors, Exhibitors and Food Vendors for the upcoming show in October. We need others to step up and help.

Blaze reported on a trip to the Amsel storage facility. It has become apparent there are several categories of contents. Items to keep, items to move to our storage under the Grange Hall, items that could be stored in the trailer, items to donate and items for the dump. It was reported that the storage facility costs us \$85 per month or \$1,020.00 a year (currently paid through June 2024). By disbursing items as per the above list we will not need the space. We will see if Restore might be interested in several of the items. Stay tuned.

Discussion took place about the status of the trailer and failed skylight. No information readily available as to its current status.

There needs to be a work party for our storage under the Grange Hall.

Morion IV: Sheila made a motion to clear out the Amsel Storage facility by the end of June and not renew our contract.

Lori seconded, motion – carried unanimously.

Blaze brought up the subject of the having an ongoing Junior's Program. It is very valuable to the mission of our club, however, there are issues when working with children. Workers need to be vetted and we do not have information on what this entails. Discussion took place on how to reach children, like possibly going into the schools for a presentation. Lori suggested we reach out to the science fairs that some of the schools hold.

Blaze reported that he is working on a tailgate show to be held at the Banner Grange on the weekend of 5/18, 2024. It will be \$15.00 per vendor space. Lori suggested the club also have a



booth to get the word out. Blaze will be there the weekend before selling and will promote the tailgate event at that time.

Mike reported that the Earth Treasurers budget has been settled.

Sheila reported that we have submitted the information for school scholarships to the Nevada Union High School district for consideration by students. We have offered \$500 for a student interested in pursuing earth sciences.

Blaze reported that he has set up a tour of the vernal pools, rock formations, etc. at Beale AFB for 4/11/2024. Interested parties must be vetted prior to getting on the base. If inclement weather a back-up date of 4/25/2024 is available. He will talk about this at the General Meeting.

Mike brought up the subject of paid members vs. the number we paid the federation for. Mike will work with Charles Lindquist to resolve this item.

Lori talked about having a directory of members who have services or businesses that club members might be interested in. This information could be part of our Rock Writings. We need someone to take this on.

April General Meeting Minutes (4/2/2024)

The meeting was called to order by President Blaze Baker at 7:07 pm.

Pledge of Allegiance.

Blaze reported that the Placerville Gem Show is scheduled for 4/13-14/2024.

Blaze reported that plans are set in place for our tailgate sale at the Banner Grange on McCourtney Road. There will be a \$15 charge per parking place, and sale begins at 8 am with set-up at 7 am.

If you have not paid your annual dues it is now past due. Please take care of it.

Blaze reported that a trip was made to the storage unit, Amsel Way Storage, and there were a lot of items determined to be in several categories. Items to keep and move to either the storage at the Grange, items that can go to the trailer, items to be donated and items for a dump run. The unit costs us \$85 per month (\$1,020 per year) and is deemed not worth the cost.

The topic of the Junior's Program was discussed by the Board at their meeting. We do not have a leader for the group and also coming to light is anyone working with children needs to be vetted. There is a possibility of working with the schools and this will be explored. Frank Van Hecke has advised that he will work with the Vendors, Exhibitors and Food Vendors for the show. We will need lots of volunteers to fill in and keep the show a viable part of the club. Be ready to step up and do your part to help make it a success.

Sheila reported that a scholarship template has been loaded into the Nevada Joint Union High School District's website, Going Merry. We have had 19 applications and the scholarship committee is working on a selection. The scholarship is \$500 this year for a high school senior majoring in earth sciences.

John Dolman advised that trip sign-up sheets are on the table for those interested in going.

Blaze reported that the date of 4/11/2024 is set for a field trip to Beale AFB to visit vernal pools, geological settings and Bald Mountain. In case of inclement weather, the date of 4/25/2024 is set. In order to attend, each person needs to be cleared and must submit their information which includes CDL#, DOB, SS#, etc. He suggested that if you do not think you



qualify, perhaps do not plan to attend. If there is anyone rejected, he will be notified but not the reason. He will be sending out an information sheet to those who want to attend.

Sunshine report by Lori advised that we need to keep Katie Baker in our thoughts.

Lori advised that the program for next month will be a speaker on opals.

Lori stated that we would like to let members know about members who have rock related businesses such as rock shops or perhaps jewelry repairs. We are looking at having that information available in our newsletter, Rock Writings. Please let us know if you would like to be included.

Blaze reported that we are in the process of compiling all our records, in one place, and with a schedule on what and how long to keep certain records. We have located our original papers, some financial records, as well as minutes of past meetings. Once these are "in order" we will store them in one place for future reference. They will be in our storage area at the Grange Hall (men's restroom locker). We are getting organized!!

After a break – Frank Van Hecke presided as the auctioneer for the meeting program. We had lots of good stuff and profit from the sale will be donated to a local mining museum. Treasurer Mike reports that we had a profit of \$558.00. Thank you everyone!




