

Our Local Geologic Timeline & Glaciation

It is easier to learn our local geology if you're aware of the big events, as they occur on the timeline. We've had a lot of geological action around here, what with subduction and glaciation, so of course this graphic shows just a few events:



(Apologies for the Comic Sans font. We all went through that phase....)

About three million years b.p. a glacial age began. Glaciers appeared at the high elevations, grew down into the canyons, then melted. The cycle repeated many times, with each period named according to both the time and location. Erosion went into hyperdrive, and the canyons were scoured deep as the glaciers moved tremendous amounts of earth downstream. The inland sea filled up with this material and became the Central Valley.



The higher ridges escaped the glaciers' scouring, so today the Sierra Crest is still capped by remnants of ancient volcanic activity. The crest of the Foresthill Divide, for example, has areas of rhyolitic ash capped with welded tuff and old lahars of the Mehrten formation, with small basaltic outcrops from the same age as Devils Peak.

Glaciers mold the land in interesting ways, polishing the rock and digging out potholes, while leaving erratics scattered in their wake. They were big. Take a moment sometime at the Emigrant Gap viewpoint to visualize yourself standing on a rocky island, surrounded by snow and ice. A glacier in the valley of Lake Spaulding wraps around Clyde Mountain and pours into the South Yuba Gorge. Part of it overflows into Bear Valley, finally disappearing at the valley's lower end. Another glacier flows down (pretty much fills) Carpenter Valley. During some glacial periods, the ice would have been several hundred feet higher than your present position, at its deepest lapping around the summit of Black Mountain.

Pick out the polished rock of distant scrapes which defines the glacier's height. The country was different 70,000 years ago.


